Henry David Jensen was born 13 Jun 1826 in Schleswig-Holstein, Germany. He married 2 Feb 1855 in Edwardsville, Madison County, Illinois to Gebke Bauman born 1 Nov 1829 also from Schleswig. They lived one mile east of Minonk, Woodford Co., Ill. There were seven children born to this union: David, Albert, Henry, William, George b 29 May 1866,d 20 Jan 1946, Mary and Peter.

Henry Jensen fought for the Union Army during the Civil War.

In 1885 they decided to move to a newer state. Henry and Gebke's oldest son, David, went ahead of the family and found a farm for them near Lincoln, Nebraska. The Jensen's sold their place and their belongings all except the necessities to start anew, and these were loaded on a freight train box car for shipment to Nebraska. Henry had a very bad cold but kept going, so the snow was very deep. Mary's father George, said his father, Henry, fell in the snow and he saw him kneel there as if praying. He died, 16 Feb 1885, before they could leave Illinois, with pneumonia and was put in a box car and taken to Nebraska where he is buried. Gebke had the seven children to care for.

Gebke died July 4, 1906, burial at Bennett, Nebraska.

Madison Circuit Court, May term, A.D. 1857, BE IT REMEMBERED, That on the 22nd day of May A.D. 1857 at the May Term of the Circuit Court in and for the County of Madison and the State of Illinois, Henry Jansen an Alien and a subject of the Duke of Holstein having proved to the satisfaction of said Circuit Court, that he had resided in the United States at least FIVE years and in the State of Illinois at least One year preceeding the day and year of aforesaid, during which time he has conducted himself as a man of good moral character, attached is the principals of the Constitution of the United States, and well disposed to the good order and happiness of the same... And he having taken the preparatory steps required by the Laws of the United States, concerning the Naturalization of Foreigners... And having declared, in open Court, an Oathe, that he will support the Constitution of the United States AND that he absolutely RENOUNCES and ABJURES FOREVER, all Allegiance and Fidelity, to every FOREIGN POWER, PRINCE, STATE AND SOVEREIGNTY whatever; and particularly to the DUKE of HOLSTEIN in DENMARK of whom he was a subject.

It was ordered by the said Court, that the said Henry Jansen be admitted a Citizen of the United States of America; and that the same be certified accordingly. Witness.. Chas O. Springer, Clerk of the Circuit Court of Madison

County, and the Seale thereof, at Edwardsville, this 22nd day of May, A.D. 1857.

Henry was unhappy when Germany took over this part of Denmark so when he came to the United States and took out his citizenship papers he changed his name to Jensen. (According to document spelling was Jansen.)

He knew Gebka Bauman in Denmark, but she and her sister came over later. (1851 according to the article from Bauman listed below) After they were married in Illinois they moved to Rollo, Missouri. Four children were born there to them. David, Albert, Henry, and William and twin brother who passed away a few days after birth. After the Civil War they moved back to Woodford County Illinois where three more children were born. They are George, Mary and Peter.

Henry fought for the North in the Civil War and Gebka was alone with two babies, David and Albert. She hid bacon and other supplies on rafters in the barn but the soldiers came through and took these supplies, so they lived on mush and milk. This made Henry so unhappy he wouldn't take a pension from the government for fighting in the war. He said that if they couldn't take care of his family while he was fighting for his Country, he didn't want their money now.

They moved back to Illinois where the children grew up. In 1885 they decided to move to a new state, Nebraska. They sold most of their belongings on January 14, 1885. The rest of the belongings were loaded in a box-car freight train for shipment to Nebraska. Henry had a very bad cold but kept going, the snow being very deep and cold. His son George said he fell in the snow and saw him kneel as if praying.

He died from pneumonia before they left Illinois. His casket was put in the boxcar and brought with the family to Nebraska. The boxcar caught fire but nothing was destroyed. Gebka had the children to take care of alone. When they were all married, she made her home with them, even making trips to Oklahome where Albert and George lived. She passed away at her daughter Mary's home July 4th 1906 after a lingering illness. She is buried beside Henry in the Bennett Cemetery.

Also noted: The Henry D. Jensen family.... They lived in Missouri during the Civil War. The children would take corn in the wagon to town to be ground and on their way home the "rebels" would take the corn from them.

Rites for Mrs. Minnie Jensen, wife of George W. Jensen, who died early Saturday at the home in Calumet, will be conducted at the Calumet Methodist Church at 2:30 p.m. Monday by Rev. A.T. Steiger, pastor.

Death was attributed to a cerebral hemorrhage. Mrs. Jensen was 62 years of age, having been born Oct 28, 1874 in Mississippi. She and her husband had resided in the Calumet community since coming to the Calumet community since coming to Canadian county in 1894, from Texas.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. B.R. Vogel of Union City and Mrs. C.J. Hansen of Calumet, and eight grandchildren.

Interment will be in the El Reno cemetery with arrangements directed by Benson Funeral Home.

DEATH CLAIMS GEORGE JENSEN, FUNERAL RITES ARE PLANNED AT CALUMET

George W. Jensen, 79, of 101 South Grand Avenue, died Sunday after a lengthy illness at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Ben Vogel, of Union City.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Calumet Methodist Church, with Rev. C.J. Dennison, pastor, and Rev. Velma Hart, pastor of the Union City Methodist church, in charge.

Burial will be made in the Calumet cemetery with Benson Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Jensen was born May 29, 1865, in Alton, Illinois. He came to Oklahoma in 1894 and homesteaded a farm five miles northeast of Calumet. He later moved to Calumet where he was a rural mail carrier for seven years and lived there until a year ago. He was a member of the Methodist Church of Calumet.

Mrs. Jensen, whom he married in 1895, died eight years ago.

Survivors, other than Mrs. Vogel, include another daughter, Mrs. C.J. Hansen, of Calumet; two brothers, David Jensen, Bennett, Neb.; and Peter Jensen, of Garland, Nebraska; and eight grandchildren.

George William Jensen was born May 29, 1866 at Alton, Ill. His father, Henry David Jensen and mother, Gebke Bauman. Henry was born June 13, 1826 and Gebke Nov 1, 1829, both were born in Schleswig-Holstein, Germany. They were married Feb 2, 1855 in Edwardsville, Ill. They had seven children, George being the 5th. They were raised southeast of Minonk, Ill. Henry fought for the Union during the Civil War. Death was Feb. 16, 1885, burial in Bennett, Nebraska.

George was 19 when the family moved to Bennet in February 1885. He helped with the younger children and the housework. He worked in Bowman's Furniture Store in Lincoln, Neb. where he learned the carpenter trade. He bought a violin and taught himself how to play. Gebke died July 4, 1906, burial at Bennett, Nebraska.

George moved to Texas in 1893 before coming to Oklahoma Territory in 1894 to buy some land.

In the meantime he had met a young lady, Minnie Agnes Smith, who he had fallen in love with from Burkburnett, Texas, who later was to become his wife.

Making the trip with wagon and horses he arrived at Caddo Jake Crossing, Canadian County, Oklahoma, on the South Canadian River. The river was flooding and had to be forded as there were no bridges. People were encamped on the south side waiting for the river to recede. George, not wanting to wait on the river and to stay out of the quicksand, had to cross on the rock river bed. George kept his horses straight and made it across.

George located 160 acres northeast of Calumet in NW 1/3, S31-T14-R8. Using the money from his father's estate and money he had saved he bought a relinquishment for \$500. from a Mr. Afenstranger who was homesteading. There was a 2-room house, cellar, milk house and well. The farm is now owned by the Rector Brooks' and farmed by David Hoffman.

After George settled he went back to Burkburnett in the Spring of 1895, where he and Minnie were married March 4. She was born at South Carrollton,

Miss. Oct 28, 1874 and the daughter of William James Smith and Nancy Jane (Clark) Smith. George brought his bride back to the new frontier. The wild animals and fear of the Indians were always a worry to the farmer.

George was also a carpenter and helped build some of the first buildings at Darlington, which was the nearest town to trade. He was working at the time of the tornado of 1899 struck and destroyed their home.

George had gone to Darlington for the Doctor when it was time for "Mary's arrival", Nov. 21, 1899. A neighbor, Mrs. Roscum and a negro lady they called "Nigger Babe", who were midwives came and delivered Mary. Mrs. Roscum's daughter Carrie, took Dona riding. Mary had arrived when they got back and Mrs. Roscum said to Dona " 'didn't you see those big pockets in Nigger Babe's apron? She had that baby in one of those pockets."

In 1904 George took and passed the Civil Service exam for Rural Letter Carriers out of Calumet. He delivered the mail for 7 years and built his own mail carts. Later he also operated the cream station for several years. They lived in Calumet at this time so Mary who was 5 and Dona 9 could start to school.

Grade school years were happy ones for Mary. She liked spelling and reading in which she won several gold medals in the rural school competition.

George was confirmed in the St. Paul's Evangelical Church in Minonk, Ill. when he was growing up; later he joined the Methodist Church at Calumet where they were all members.

Minnie died June 12, 1937 at Calumet and George died in El Reno Jan. 20, 1946. Both are buried in the Calumet Cemetery.

Excerpt taken from a photocopy of a newspaper clipping (probably printed in the Lawton Constitution):

BULLETIN: "Mrs. Fred C. Larrance, 58, of 508 B Avenue, wife of the manager of the Larrance Tank Corp. and former mayor of Lawton, died suddenly of a heart attack about 2:15 this afternoon in a local theater, a few minutes after she sat down to see the picture. The theater ticket seller said Mrs. Larrance appeared tired but otherwise normal when she bought her tickets a few minutes earlier. A resident of Lawton since 1901, Mrs. Larrance is survived by her husband and three children; Fred, Jr. San Antonio, TX; Earl, of 816 H; and Mrs. A. W. Parker, Ness City, KS."

Rites set for Mrs. Larrance: "Last rites for Mrs. Fred C. Larrance, 58, wife of the head of the Larrance Tank Copr. and pioneer Lawton resident, will be held here Friday afternoon. The funeral is set for 2:30pm at the First Presbyterian church. The Rev. Thompson Gene Hodges, pastor, will officiate. Burial will be in highland cemetery. The Lawton funeral home is in charge of arrangements. DIES IN THEATER -- Mrs. Larrance died suddenly of a heart attack only a few minutes after entering a local theater here yesterday afternoon. Another patron saw her slump over in her seat and reported to the ticket office that she was ill. Policeman Tom Phipps, checking meters outside the theater, was summoned. Mrs. Larrance was believed dead when he reached her. An ambulance was called. IN LAWTON SINCE 1902 -- Mrs. Larrance was born Janett Elsie Jensen March 22, 1886 in Illinois. She came to Lawton in February, 1902 from Calumet, Oklahoma. Four years later, on March 24, 1906, she was married to Mr. Larrance. She was a member of the First Presbyterian church and the Eastern Star lodge. Survivors, besides her husband, are two sons, Earl, 816 H; and Fred, Jr., an aviation cadet at San Antonio, Texas; one daughter, Mrs. A.W. (Maud) Parker, Ness City, Kansas; six grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Della Murphy, and Mrs. Ella Martin, both of Tulsa; and Mrs. Ethel Stevens, Ponca City; and three brothers, Henry and Lee Jensen, Calumet, and George Jensen, Fremont, Nebraska.
